

Background

- As part of a recent Federal Election commitment, additional funding is anticipated to expand the Medicare Urgent Care Clinic program, including potential clinics in Cairns and Mackay
- Australian Government has committed to \$366.4 million to establish a further 50 Medicare Urgent Care Clinics (Medicare UCCs) over 3 years (2025-26 to 2027-28), throughout Australia, bringing the total number of Medicare UCCs to 137.
- Two currently in operation in the NQPHN region (Cairns and Townsville)





Program goals

- Provide short term, episodic care for urgent conditions that are not immediately life-threatening
- Offering 'no wrong door' entry point to access episodic urgent medical care, including walk-in and ambulance diversion
- Provide a welcoming, compassionate, culturally appropriate, person-centred, and safe environment that is inclusive for all people accessing quality care
- Reduce demand on hospital EDs
- Provide care closer to home
- Improve coordination between primary and acute care

Operational Guidance

- The Medicare Urgent Care Clinics Operational Guidance has been developed by the Australian Government in consultation with state and territory governments
- Outlines the scope and minimum services to be offered at clinics and are reviewed on a regular basis

Lessons learnt

- High demand in regional areas
- Stakeholder collaboration (PHNs, QAS, HHSs, local General Practice) is critical
- Marketing and education essential to increase community awareness
- Flexible, locally tailored models drive success

NQPHN Medicare Urgent Care Clinic data

The top reasons for presentation UCCs in the NQPHN region since opening are:

- laceration
- urinary tract infection (UTI)
- rash
- abdominal pain
- respiratory tract infection
- skin infection

Emergency department presentations that were not medical emergencies and could have presented to Medicare Urgent Care Clinic conditions include:



Choosing the right care

- The Choose the Right Care flyer was developed to help patients, families, and healthcare referrers understand the most appropriate healthcare setting based on urgency and need.
- Medicare Urgent Care Clinics provide short-term, episodic care for urgent but non-life-threatening conditions.
- UCCs are not a replacement for a patient's regular GP and do not provide ongoing care or chronic disease management.


